

# Lesson 3 Commas—Two Adjectives Tests

# **Instructor Notes**

This lesson can be difficult for some students. Be generous when reviewing their work, and be ready to talk about why answers might be considered "right" or "wrong."

# Lesson 3: Commas—Two Adjectives Tests

The buzzword for this rule is *two adjectives tests*.

A comma should *sometimes* be used between two or more adjectives that come before a noun. It's that *sometimes* that makes us nervous. How are we supposed to know when we need a comma and when we don't? Don't worry—there are a couple of tests you can do to check!

### 1) "And" test

If it sounds natural to put the word **and** between the adjectives, you need a comma. If adding **and** makes the sentence read less smoothly, leave the comma out.

**Example 1:** That is a lovely soft fuzzy sweater.

Test: *a lovely* **and** *soft sweater* Sounds good. We need a comma.

a soft **and** fuzzy sweater Sounds good. We need a comma.

The sentence needs two commas:

That is a lovely, soft, fuzzy sweater.

**Example 2:** I saw a little old man.

Test: *a little and old man* Sounds odd. Forget the comma.

The sentence is correct without commas:

I saw a little old man.

#### 2) Order test

Try changing the order of the adjectives. If it still sounds right without changing the meaning, you need commas. Let's use the same example sentences as above to check this test:

**Example 1:** That is a lovely soft fuzzy sweater.

Test: a soft lovely fuzzy sweater Sounds good.

a fuzzy soft lovely sweater Sounds good.

a lovely fuzzy soft sweater Sounds good.

Yes, these all sound just fine, as does any other combination we could come up with. We need commas between the adjectives:

That is a lovely, soft, fuzzy sweater.

**Example 2:** I saw a little old man.

Test: an old little man Sounds odd (to native English speakers)

No, we shouldn't change the order, because it makes the reader stumble over the phrase. No comma should be used.


